Invitation for Expression of Interest

Subject: Expression of Interest to establishment of Custom Hire Service Centers (CHSC).

Intent:

The Department of Agriculture intends to establish Custom Hire Service Centers (CHSC) at Hobli level in the specified Districts in the State during the year 2017-18. The details of scope of the programme and terms of reference are annexed.

Who can apply:

Registered Charitable Trusts Registered under Section 25 of Companies Act, 1956/Organizations/Non Government Organizations (NGO)/Registered Farmers Producers Organizations (FPOs)/ Farm Machineries Manufacturers, Individuals who are currently running Custom Hire Service Centers as franchisees provided they are registered as individual proprietor/s Firm.

Service Provider:

The short listed any of the above will be therein-after called as **Service Provider** and such of they shall submit the duly filled in application form as per the format annexed.

Documents:

The **Service Provider** who is interested in participating in the Expression of Interest should furnish the following information:

1. Profile of the Service Provider.
2. Annual Report, Balance Sheet for the past three years (2014-15, 2015-16 and 2016-17).
3. Brief write up of about 100 words, including monetary value with details of relevant assignments completed in the past three years.
4. Complete details of staff with the Service Provider along with their resume.

The interested **Service Provider** may download information on e-procurement website [https://eproc.karnataka.gov.in.](https://eproc.karnataka.gov.in), and they have to collect digital keys and pass words from e-Governance. Security Deposit: The Service Provider should submit a security deposit of Rs.1.00lakh per centre for which they desire to apply for and further that it is compulsory to apply for all the centers notified in any given District. One Service Provider can apply for more than one District also.

Unit: District is treated as one (1) unit.

Note: The Service Provider to offer quotes for all the identified centres in a district.

ANNEXURE- I

Background

Karnataka State is typically an agrarian State with 190.5lakh ha. of geographical area with 99.23lakh ha of net sown area (Year 2013-14) and has about 78.32lakh ha operational holdings (Agri Census 2010-11) of which 76% are small and marginal holdings.

Diversified Agriculture and Horticulture crops grown in varied Agro-climatic regions of the state. The challenge is to get higher yields, in spite of vagaries of nature besides other problems such as decrease in the availability of agriculture labourers, migration of farmers from rural area to cities etc. Mechanisation of farm activities is the need of hour to increase production and productivity. Though subsidy is being provided for farm machinery, due to prohibitive cost of farm machinery all farmers may not come forward to own them. Hence, establishment of Custom Hire Service Centre (CHSC) is a boon for farmers especially for the small and marginal farmers. So far, 314 Farm Machinery CHSC have been established.

The Service Provider is selected at District level and they have to establish Custom Hire Service Centres (CHSC) at Hobli level in the selected District. One Service Provider can apply for more than one District. To participate in the process minimum selection unit is District.

Custom Hire Service Centres (CHSC) in Two Slabs: Based on the Agricultural density the Custom Hire Centers are categorized into 2 slabs, that is Slab-1 and Slab-2. The establishment period is spread over for two years and the year wise activity is specified.

Slab-1, Rs.75.00lakhs: Farm Machineries of Rs.75.00 lakhs worth are proposed to be deployed in each center. The Department of Agriculture proposes to establish 181 CHSCs during the year 2017-18 under Slab-1.

Slab-2, Rs.40.00lakhs: Farm Machineries of Rs.40.00 lakhs worth are proposed to be deployed in each center. In Malnad region (Dakshina Kannada, Udupi, Uttara Kannada, Kodagu, Shimoga and Chikmagalur-6 Districts) and in the areas where monocropping system is common (Kolar and Chikballapur- 2 Districts), wherein, Rs.75.00lakhs worth implements may not be required. In these Districts under Slab-2 the Department of Agriculture proposes to establish 69 CHSCs during the year 2017-18.

Government Assistance(Back Ended) for each centre: Of the specified total worth of the Farm Machineries, over for two years period, under Slab-1(Rs.75.00lakhs) & Slab-2 (Rs.40.00lakhs) the Government contribution will be limited to an extent of 70% and the remaining 30% contribution will be from the Service Providers. Financial Assistance pattern spread over 2 years period is more specifically given below.

ANNEXURE-II

I. The specific objectives of Custom Hire Service Centres :

1. To address the constraints in land preparation activities by providing efficient land preparation Farm machinery and equipments on Custom Hire Service basis.
2. To Reduce Sowing/Transplanting window leading to consequent reduction in harvesting window.
3. To ensure Effective intercultivation and other cultural operations.
4. To ensure Effective harvesting with reduced harvest window leads to minimization of harvesting losses.
5. To encourage in-situ moisture conservation and to harness the residual moisture of Kharif season for Rabi Pulses and Oilseeds.
6. To enhance the production and productivity of the crops.
7. To provide services of Hi - Tech Farm Machinery services to small and marginal farmers.
8. To run the centers throughout the year effectively, efficiently and profitably

II. Earnest Money Deposit:

EMD at the rate of Rs.1.00 lakh per CHSC in the form of Bank guarantee, in the name of Director of Agriculture should be submitted valid for a period of five years. E.M.D of the disqualified Service Provider will be refunded immediately. The EMD of the selected Service Provider shall be retained by the Department as security deposit and will be refunded after the validity period of the EOI after obtaining **Successful work Certificate** from all the District Joint Directors of Agriculture or shall be forfeited in the event of violation of terms and conditions of Expression of Interest.

III. Selection Criteria for Service Provider:

Agriculture scenario has witnessed a great change since last decade. With the enormous development of urban areas and migration of rural labour class to the urban areas for employment has resulted in scarcity of labour for agricultural operations. In this context, mechanisation in agriculture is an only alternative to solve the labour problem being faced by our farming community today. Mechanisation not only helps in solving the problem of labour, but also enables to carry out agricultural activities in right time. The major constraint in mechanisation is that small and marginal farmers cannot afford to purchase costly machinery and equipments. Custom Hire Service Centers (CHSC) enable to

overcome these constraints as they provide services of machinery on hire basis to small and marginal farmers at right time. With this background it is proposed to select Service Provider to implement the programme on a PPP model.

The criteria for selection of Service Providers,

1. Service Provider should be registered.
2. Should have minimum of Rs.1.00crore Net worth and should submit last three years Annual Audit Report.
3. A minimum of 25 workers should be working and should be actively functioning for the past three years.
4. Service Provider should have minimum of 5 persons who have knowledge about Agriculture/Agri-Business/Farm machinery.
5. The selected Service Provider will mandatorily have maximum of 3 members to run each of the CHSC including support technical staffs, mechanic and driver. However, they may engage additional staff in order to facilitate the farmers to carryout timely agricultural operations, as and when needed.
6. Service Provider is not eligible to participate against whom Criminal case registered in police station/pending in any court.
7. Service Provider should not be blacklisted in any State and they should submit an affidavit to that aspect.
8. In case performance is same for all parameters, then preference will be given for local Service Provider for establishment of CHSC.
9. If more than one local Service Provider found to be eligible then the Service Provider ready to invest higher amount for establishment of CHSC will be considered.

IV Functional Modalities:

1. **SPV (Special Purpose Vehicle):** Successful Service Provider can form a SPV (Special Purpose Vehicle) company (registered under section 25 of Companies Act, 1956) at their discretion to carry out the performance of the contract.

2. **Franchisee option:** The selected Service Provider may use franchisee for the establishment of Custom Hire Service Centers (CHSC). However, it is the responsibility of the selected Service Provider to abide by the terms and conditions of the Expression of Interest. The service provider should take all necessary steps so that, franchisee should open the CHSC and make it operational as per the EOI terms. Ultimately, it is the responsibility of the selected Service Provider to establish the CHSC centers and run the centers.
3. **Coordination:** Service Provider should function/work in co-ordination with the Department of Agriculture.
4. **Throughout the cropping season:** The functioning of the Service Provider throughout the cropping season is mandatory.
5. **Insurance:** Service Provider should make provision for Insuring all the farm machinery shelved in the CHSC against natural disaster/robbery/theft (2% of the total amount of the implements provided by the department should be paid as insurance by the Service Provider).
6. **Bench Mark Survey:** The Service Provider should undertake a bench mark survey within the proposed jurisdiction of each of the CHSCs and complete within 1 month from the date of issue of work order. The bench-mark survey is to develop the data-base of the availability of Farm Machineries and equipments meeting specific promotion of innovative agricultural practices and new technologies. Based on the survey the Farm Machineries required to be deployed is determined taking into consideration the local Agricultural Practices and Technology promotion. The bench mark data is also used to ascertain the already available Farm Machineries with local farmers which can be aggregated under the custom hire provisioning.
7. **Aggregator model :** Since, the Farm Machineries shelved in CHSC limited to Rs.75.00lakhs & Rs.40.00lakhs it is very much difficult to meet out the complete local requirement particularly during the peak agricultural season. To meet the local demand for Farm Machineries the famers who have availed the equipments/machines/implements under the departmental subsidy scheme and others are proposed to link them under aggregator model. The objective is to make all the machinery available, in the vicinity areas of the CHSCs for hire. Under the Aggregator Model the service provider may work out a suitable hire charge sharing modality with the local machinery owning farmers in

consultation with the Agriculture Department. To the extent possible this model will be operationalised.

8. **Farm-Machinery Booking:** Service Provider should make suitable arrangements/facilities for booking Farm-Machinery by farmers both in on-line & off-line mode. The booking facilitation should also provide for the aggregated farm machinery booking with suitable rental sharing mechanism worked out.
9. **Mobile Registration APP(Application) :** The suitable customer friendly mobile APP enabling seamless hiring facilitation of the farm machineries from the CHSC will be deployed by the Service Provider. The mobile APP should be deployed within 02 months from the date of issue of work order. The APP should also have facility to track actual time duration of machinery engagement in the farmer field and should display time of work and total hire charges accruing based on machinery working hour duration. The APP should be enabled to send auto SMS to the farmer on machinery booking confirmation and the machinery working hour duration and total rental money etc. The App also should enable effective operationalisation of the proposed Aggregator model.

10. Fixing of the Hiring Charges:

i) The hiring and service charges for tractor and other equipments shall be fixed by the Districts Implements Committee headed by Chief Executive Officer with District Joint Director of Agriculture, President of District Krishik Samaj, leading farm machinery manufacturer in the District, ADA (SMS) and 2 progressive farmer/ Krishi Prashasthi Awardee, CHSC representative, University of Agricultural Sciences representative as members.

ii) The committee shall take into account the fuel prices, interest payable to bank on loan and return on investment, salary of drivers, repairs, both preventive and breakdown, distance from Service Centre to fields, wears and tears, life of the machinery and other incidental expenses including establishment expenses while determining the hiring charges. Separate hiring charges should be fixed for Small & Marginal Farmers as a category and other category farmers, wherein hiring charges for Small and Marginal category farmers will be lower than the other category farmers.

iii) Rates should be reasonable and realistic and should be in reference to market rates as obtaining from time to time.

11. **Hire charges under Aggregator model:** Rent/Hiring charges should be same as that of the rent fixed for machinery shelved in the CHSC centers by the District Implementation Committee. While renting out the Farm Machinery, Preference should be given for Farm Machinery deployed in CHSC centres followed by the Farm Machinery available in the aggregator model.

12. **Farm Machinery tracking mechanism:** Service Provider should develop Farm Machinery tracking mechanism by adopting GPS system for all the machinery deployed in the CHSC.

13. **Down Time management:**

i) The Service Providers should take all possible necessary steps to run the CHSC centre profitably by making efficient and effective use of Farm Machineries.

ii) Maximum down time for each Farm Machineries should be fixed based on the average usage.

iii) **Down time Incentives:** Maximum *Down-Time* allowed is 40hrs per month. If the *Down-Time* reduced by 40hrs, incentive should be given at the rate of Rs.50/- for every 10hrs reduction in the down time to the farmers registered under aggregator model by Service Provider.

iv) **Dis - incentives:** If the Down-Time exceeds more than 40hrs per month, service provider has to pay penalty of Rs.50/- for every 10hrs increase in Down-Time.

14. **Training:** Prime movers are very much essential to perform all agricultural operations. Efficient & effective use of prime movers particularly in peak agricultural season and their maintenance should be given utmost priority by the Service Provider. Service Provider should make use of locally available drivers and train them effectively and ensure that, prime movers are put in to optimum use without any breakdown particularly in peak hours.

1. **Information Dissemination and Publicity:** Service Providers should give wide publicity on Aggregator Model and also about the concept & purpose for which CHSC is established through leaf-lets, newspaper advertisements, pamphlets, mass media publicity etc., so that maximum number of farmers can avail the benefits from the CHSC centers. The selected Service Provider should also provide detailed information about the crop specific equipments/ machines/implements required to perform timely operations and the method of operation of these Machineries to the farmers.

2. **Maintenance of CHSC centre wise catalogue:** Each Service Provider should develop centre-wise catalogue providing information about cropping pattern of the region, farm machinery requirement pertaining to cropping pattern, availability of the farm machinery at the CHSC centres and with the farmers enrolled under Aggregator model and their address and contact numbers.
3. **Display of Information at CHSC centres:** The selected Service Provider should affix the board in the prime location of the CHSC centre and also in public places which is easily accessible to farmers. Detail information about the centres name, available equipments details and their hiring charges should be furnished.

V. OPERATIONAL GUIDELINES:

- 1) **District as a unit:** For the purpose of selection of Service Provider District will be treated as a Unit and they need to apply for all the CHSC centers proposed in the District.
- 2) **Agreement Validity:** The selected Service Provider should enter into an agreement with the Department. This agreement is valid for a period of 6 years from the date of signing the agreement and the CHSC should compulsorily run for 6 years. The agreement may be extended further on mutually agreed terms subject to the satisfactory performance of the CHSC.
- 3) **Submission of Letter of Acceptance (LOA) by the Service Provider:** The Service Provider should submit Letter of Acceptance (LOA) within 10 days from the date of issue of Letter of Intimation (LOI) to perform the obligations as stipulated.
- 4) **Agreement:** The Service provider after submitting LOA shall execute an Agreement covering all the Terms and Conditions on a Judicial Stamp Paper (Purchased in the favour of Director of Agriculture) of Rs.200/- or as per the existing procedure at their cost **within 15 days** from the date of submission of Letter of Acceptance(LOA).
- 5) **Erection of Sheds:** The Service Provider should erect the Sheds for deploying the farm machineries within one (1) month from the date of issue of work order.
- 6) **Establishment of CHSC:** The CHSC should be established and functional within 4 months from the date of issue of work order.

- 7) **Ownership of the equipment deployed:** The ownership of the equipments/ machines/implements shelved under this programme in the CHSC rests with Department of Agriculture.

VI. Finance:

i) Government Assistance for each centre:

Slab 1, Rs. 75.00lakhs: The Department of Agriculture proposes to establish 181 CHSCs during the year 2017-18 under Slab-1.

Slab 2, Rs.40.00lakhs: The Department of Agriculture proposes to establish 69 CHSCs during the year 2017-18 under Slab-2.

* **Back Ended Assistance:-** The successful Service Provider need to open Subsidy account and deposit their share (during first year, Rs.11.25 lakhs and Rs.6.00 lakhs for slab-1 and slab-2 respectively and during second year, Rs.11.25lakhs and Rs.6.00 lakhs for slab-1 and slab-2 respectively) in this account. The Service Provider has to finalize the list of farm equipments/implements based on the local needs and in discussion with and has to place the order with the manufacturers/ suppliers as per procedure prescribed by the Department.

Government share (during first year, upto Rs.41.25lakhs and upto Rs.22.00lakhs for slab-1 and slab-2 respectively and during second year, upto

Rs.11.25lakhs and upto Rs.6.00 lakhs for slab-1 and slab-2 respectively) would be released to the Subsidy account to be further transferred to the equipment/ implement suppliers account as soon as order is placed with different suppliers and requisite verification is done by department officials.

iii) Bank Account: The Service Provider has to maintain two separate bank accounts. One will be an ESCROW account into which the contribution of the service provider and the Government will be deposited and used exclusively to procure the farm Machinery. Second will be the Operational & Maintenance account into which the rental proceeds will be received. The bank accounts should be opened within 2 weeks from the date of issue of work order.

a) Subsidy Account: Service Provider share and Government share for procurement of equipments/machines/implements should be remitted in this account. The Service Provider should open Subsidy Account in the nationalized banks, it should be **Escrow-Joint Account** with the concerned hobli level officer. This account should be used only for transfer of Service Provider and Government share to equipments/machines/implements suppliers.

b) Operational & Maintenance Account: Service Provider should also open separate maintenance account jointly with hobli level officer for remittance of rent collected, Staff salary payment, Office/Shed rent payments, fuel charges, repairs and other miscellaneous expenditure payments etc.,

c) Time period to deposit Service Provider & Government share:

i) **During Year-1:** Service Provider should remit his share of Rs.11.25 lakhs for slab-1 and Rs.6.00 lakhs for slab-2 respectively into the subsidy escrow joint account within **60 days** from the date of issue of work order.

The Government share upto Rs.41.25 lakhs for slab-1 and upto Rs.22.00 lakhs for slab-2 respectively will be remitted to the same subsidy-escrow account to be further transferred to the suppliers account through NEFT (National Electronic Funds Transfer) as soon as the Service Provider placed the order with different suppliers and requisite verification is done by the Department officials.

ii) **During Year-2:** Service Provider should remit his share of Rs.11.25 lakhs for slab-1 and Rs.6.00 lakhs for slab-2 respectively into the subsidy escrow account within **45 days** from the commencement of financial year (ie., April-2018).

The Government share upto Rs.11.25 lakhs for slab-1 and upto Rs.6.00 lakhs for slab-2 respectively will be remitted to the same subsidy-escrow account to be further transferred to the suppliers account through NEFT (National Electronic Funds Transfer) as soon as the Service Provider placed the order with different suppliers and requisite verification is done by the Department officials.

- d) Release of the Government share during the 2nd year is strictly based on the full component utilization during the first year and also subjected to the performance of the Service Provider in the first year.
 - e) Service Provider shall bear their share of the project cost from their own resources or loan borrowed from bank or both.
 - f) **CHSC establishment Assistance:** Rs.1.50lakhs per CHSC centre will be given by the Department as one time assistance towards setting up of the CHSC centres and to meet out other miscellaneous expenses. Further this assistance grant is released into the maintenance bank Account opened for the respective CHSCs.
 - g) This is a grant and provided only after the CHSC location is finalized in the mutually agreed site between the Agriculture Department and the Service Provider. Further this is released only after the erection of CHSC office and the Machinery Shed.
 - h) Running Expenditure like salary of the personnel incharge of CHSC, rent, fuel charges, repairs and maintenance charges etc., shall be borne by the Service Provider.
 - i) **Online Customized Resource Management MIS System:** The day to day information about equipment wise usage, rent collected etc., should be maintained in the centralized on-line customized resource MIS system by the Service Provider and log-in access/facility should be given to AO, ADA, DDA, JDA and Head Office/Commissionerate of Agriculture. Objective is to have a uniform customized resource MIS maintenance system. In order to attain this all the shortlisted/finally accepted Service Providers will have only such customized system to the satisfaction of the Agriculture Department and the system will be common across the service providers. The respective service providers shall bear the expenditure on account of the system.
- iv) **Utilization Certificate:** Service Provider should submit the Annual Utilization Certificate for all the financial transactions of the CHSC through Department officers.
- v) **Audit Statement:** Service Provider should submit Audited statement every year to Assistant Director of Agriculture, Deputy Director of Agriculture,

Joint Director of Agriculture of the districts and office of Commissionerate of Agriculture at state level.

- vi) **Income generated:** The income generated from the CHSC centers shall be plugged back for the further development and strengthening of the CHSCs so that it can run even after six years.

VII. LEGAL TERMS AND COMPLIANCES:

1. TIME SCHEDULE TO PERFORM THE OBLIGATIONS:

- i) The Service Provider shall submit Letter of Acceptance (LOA) within 10 days from the date of issue of Letter of Intimation (LOI) to perform the obligations as stipulated.
 - ii) The Service provider after giving the letter of acceptance(LOA) shall execute an Agreement covering all the Terms and Conditions on a Judicial Stamp Paper (Purchased in the favour of Director of Agriculture) of Rs.200/- or as per the existing procedure at his cost **within 15 days** from the date of submission of Letter of Acceptance(LOA).
 - iii) The Service provider should open separate bank accounts: **1) Subsidy Account and 2) operational & Maintenance Account** within 2 weeks from the date of issue of work order.
 - iv) The Service Provider should complete the bench-mark survey and develop the data-base of the machinery required and remit his share in the subsidy bank account within 60 days from the date of issue of work order.
 - v) The Service Provider should erect the CHSC Sheds within 01 month and develop the mobile APP within 02 months from the date of issue of work order.
 - vi) **The successful Service Provider will have to establish Hi-Tech Custom hiring centre within 4 months from the date of issue of work order.**
2. In respect of any dispute arising out of implementation of this EOI, the decision of the Tender Accepting Authority shall be final.
 3. For any legal remedies, the court at Bengaluru shall only have the jurisdiction.
 4. Any disputes arriving during the implementation of the project, it will be resolved and settled at the level of Department of Agriculture only.

VIII. PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS AND NON PERFORMANCE

1. If the Custom Hire Service Center do not run properly (failure to establish/run or closing of the center), the concerned Service Provider should refund/ remit full Government share along with interest amount as per prevailing bank rate apart from forfeiting of Bank Guarantee, Black Listing and Legal Action.
2. If the Service provider backs out at any stage of EOI exercise, the Service provider will become ineligible to participate in any such empanelment exercise to be carried out by the authority in future apart from punitive measures including and not limited to forfeiting of EMD(Bank Guarantee), Black Listing and Legal Action.

IX. RIGHTS RESERVED:

1. The decision of the Tender/EOI Accepting Authority (Commissioner for Agriculture) shall be final in considering or rejecting service provider at any stages of this exercise.
2. The Department of Agriculture reserves the right to accept or reject the EOI at the time of processing, finalization, after finalization and even during agreement period without assigning any reasons whatsoever.

X.GENERAL CONDITIONS:

- 1) All eligible Service Provider will be provided an opportunity to present (duration -10 minutes) the organization strength and vision to establish CHSC in sustainable manner.
- 2) If the selected Service Provider unable to perform as per the terms and conditions of the Expression of Interest, preference will be given to other selected Service Provider who wishes to come forward to set up CHSC as per the terms and conditions of the Expression of Interest.
- 3) The Service Provider should not be blacklisted/terminated/withdrawn/ dropped out earlier for any activity whatsoever.

XI. The Service Provider who agrees for all the Terms and Conditions of the EOI should only participate in the EOI.

ANNEXURE-III

1) List of Farm Machineries proposed to be shelved in the Custom Hire Service Centres

Department of Agriculture provides subsidy for Farm Machinery under NFSM/ISOPOM /R.K.V.Y. and other state sector schemes. Due to prohibitive cost of farm machinery small and marginal farmers are unable to own them. Thus, establishment of Custom Hire and Service Centres (CHSC) and Shelving farm machinery required for various farm activities right from land preparation to post harvest would enable small and marginal farmers to mechanise farm activities by way of hiring the farm machinery on nominal hire charges. The farm activity wise uses of different farm machinery are as follows:



4) **Selection of Farm Machinery:** The selection of equipments required by the district/ taluk/hobli should be categorized based on the local needs and shelving of the Farm Machinery in the centres should be as follows:

- i) Predominant Equipments (60%)
- ii) Subsidiary Equipments (30%)
- iii) Tertiary Equipments (10%)

5) Farm Machinery in the CHSC centres should be deployed based on the soil types [Red (alfisols)& Black soils(vertisols)].

- 6) The horsepower (HP) of the prime movers and equipment/implement selected should be well suited with the prevailing soil conditions.
- 7) Preference shall be given for the promotion of Equipments/Machineries which is required for technology expansion.
Eg: Paddy Transplanters, Seed cum Fertilizer drills, Reapers, Combined Harvesters, Balers, High-Volume Boom Sprayers, Sugarcane Trash cutter/Mulcher, Groundnut Digger, Hydraulic Reversible Plough, Power Harrow, Laser Leveler, Potato Planter & Digger, Sugar Cane Planter etc.,
- 8) **However, the selection of Farm Machinery for the purpose of establishment of Custom Hire Service Centres (CHSC) shall be based on the local needs and suitability of soil condition.**
- 9) The above mentioned Farm Machinery list is only indicative and not exhaustive. Any additional implements required other than the listed above, can be finalized in the Committee headed by District Chief Executive Officer.
